Learning outcomes: Civil procedural law has always been considered a subject falling within the scope of national law. In recent decades, however, European legislation, as well as the case law of the Court of Justice of the EU and the European Court of Human Rights, has increasingly interfered with this traditional legal discipline, which undoubtedly leads to a reassessment of established institutions, principles and rules and ultimately justifies the importance of comparative civil law. procedural. The aim of the course is to offer students a general overview of the leading systems of the European civil process and their peculiarities. The subject thus covers mainly the fundamental institutes of civil procedural law analyzed in a comparative perspective, with special emphasis on the differences between the system of continental (civil law) and Anglo-American (common law) law. By completing the course, the student will acquire knowledge about the leading systems of civil procedural law, their structure and main features, as well as the principles of civil procedure, sources, concepts and institutes of civil procedure of several countries, including the necessary practical orientation in court proceedings. After completing the course, the student will be able to orientate in foreign procedural law and case law, will know the general procedural procedure in court proceedings and the necessary context, but will also learn other prerequisites usable in the professional sphere in the international environment. Last but not least, the student should be able to search, analyze and work with legally relevant information using the method of comparison and analogy, as well as other specific methods.
