Recent migration crisis in Europe requires, in addition to the responses of politicians and security experts also a theological position and a response of churches. The experience of migration influenced the formation of the biblical Israel and this experience found reflection also in the self-perception of the church standing behind the New Testament text. This seminar explores relevant NT texts that can serve as a basis for formulation of theological positions to the migration phenomena and to migrants.
