Week 2 (Steven Saxonberg)

Operationalizing assignment

Students will define the key terms they will use in their dissertation and define them clearly so that somebody who does not know the topic can understand it. They will also explain at least one of the theories that they will use. They will also explain this theory in a manner that somebody, who has never heard of this theory can understand it. They will further explain how they will apply the theory. This assignment should be around 3 pages and will be due in week 10, so that students will have had time to study at least one theory in great detail.

Week 3 (Steven Saxonberg)

Assignment for theories of science

Compare Popper's critical rationalist approach with Isaac's scientific realist approach. What are the advantages and disadvantages of each approach? Which approach do you prefer? Which approach do you think is most applicable to your dissertation and why is it the most applicable?

Write about 1,000 words or 2 single-spaced pages. Include page numbers from the two texts in your notes. That is in each paragraph when you discuss one of their ideas, make it clear which pages in their texts take up these issues.

Assignment for comparative studies

Take the main research question from your doctoral dissertation and discuss how you could apply your research question in a two-country comparison. Discuss both how you could analyze your research question using the method of difference and the method of agreement. For each method repeat the table in the Skocpol & Somer's article and explain why you think your countries are comparable. This means you will have either 3 countries totally or 4. For example, you might choose to use Slovakia for both the method of agreement and the method of difference, but you would use a different country to compare Slovakia for each method. In that case you will have 3 countries. Or you might decide to have two completely different sets of countries. That is fine. The important thing is that you show you know how to use the two methods. The paper once again should be about

1,000 words. You should include references both to the article (with page numbers) and to sources that you use for data on the countries that you compare.

Each paper will be pass-fail.

Weeks 4, 5 (Andrej Findor)

Assignment: Cognitive interviews (pass-fail)

Students are expected to conduct 5 cognitive interviews about research materials related to their PhD. projects and report their findings. The written report, including interview script, sample (respondents') characteristics, the original version of research materials, respondents' comments, and revised version of research materials, is due in the semester's exmination period.

# **Learning outcomes:**

Learning outcomes:

This is an advanced course for PhD students interested in deepening their understanding of diverse approaches to studying European society and politics and current trends in studying international and transnational phenomena. Upon its completion students will gain insight into real-life work of researchers working with a variety of theoretical and methodological frameworks. The course will have an opening and closing session focused on general nuts and bolts of qualitative methods in dissertation research. The ten substantive sessions will consist of presentations and workshop sessions of faculty and researchers across the FSES departments and/or guest speakers from other local and international departments. Every session will start with an opening presentation and continue with interactive discussion. Students are expected to come to class prepared, having done the required reading and being ready to engage in discussion with the lecturers. Besides getting access to a variety of research styles, the students will also train their academic communication skills (constructive criticism, argument-focused debate, etc.).

### Class syllabus:

#### Course contents:

- 1. Introduction to the course. Role of methodology in doctoral work. Rules, rights and assignments.
- 2. Field research, critique of the notion of "the field". Coloniality, ethics and directions in current IR and European studies.
- 3. Approaches to studying conflict, peace and cooperation. International and transnational processes, actors and institutions.
- 4. Qualitative methods in advancing political theory and political philosophy. Studying statehood and unrecognized states.
- 5. Historical and ethnographic methods. Focus on post-socialism.
- 6. Complexity in the Anthropocene. IR and interdisciplinary conversations on human and non-human agency.
- 7. Feminist approaches to studying politics. Gender as an analytical lens.
- 8. Learning to swim in inaccessible and confusing contexts. Interviewing and other conversational strategies.
- 9. Analysis of audiovisual material. Making sense of words and images.
- 10. The world at home. Studying global processes in local settings. Urban ethnography and/or participatory action research.
- 11. Legal research methods. Making sense of proceedings of European courts. Finding and analyzing court documents.
- 12. Final colloquium
