- What was the motivation of the student for choosing the given workplace?
- What was the goal of the internship and how did the student fulfill it?
- What did the student learn in internship?
- What knowledge or skills taught at school did the student use?
- What knowledge or skills did the student lack?
- How will the completed internship contribute to the choice of employment after graduation?
- What does the student take away from internship? How does the student evaluate the internship overall?

Learning outcomes:
