Learning outcomes: This course is designed to introduce students of Protestant theology to key issues and figures in the history of Western philosophy from the late patristic period to the present. In doing so, it takes into account both the context of Protestant theology and the treatment of issues in the history of philosophy of religion. Upon completion of the course, the student will gain a basic understanding of selected philosophical concepts along with their application to a specific historical period. The knowledge thus acquired will enable the student to apply the relevant concepts in his/her further studies, especially in the fields of systematic theology, church history, history of dogma and philosophy of religion.	
Class syllabus: In terms of content and themes, we will focus on the area of philosophical problems, which are historically defined by the period of the late patristic period up to the present day. We dedicate the period of patristic philosophy to its chief representative, Augustine. Within medieval philosophy, we emphasize in particular the controversy over universals and the conceptions of the representatives of late scholasticism (Roger Bacon, Duns Scotus, William Ockham). Thematically, we will focus mainly on ontological issues with reference to semantic problems related to theological terms. We will devote the period of Renaissance philosophy to the problem of the Reformation in the context of philosophical thought, taking into account ethical issues. We examine modern philosophy against the background of the debate between empiricism and rationalism (epistemological issues), which we follow up with a basic characterization of the Enlightenment and an explanation of its relation to religion (issues in political and social philosophy). In particular, we will present the history of 19th- and 20th-century philosophy through a comprehensive characterization of Immanuel Kant's	

work and the currents of thought that responded to Kant's philosophical initiative. Finally, we will discuss the most important currents of 20th century philosophy: phenomenology, existentialism, structuralism, and analytic philosophy, with an emphasis on semantic issues. We will also introduce key figures in philosophy of religion, or 20th century philosophy of religion.

Learning outcomes: The graduate of the course will gain knowledge about current pastoral trends in the present, the content and methodical emphasis of pastoral service, as well as basic communication skills. He can compare these emphases and then effectively apply them in specific pastoral situations in the service of the individual. He will gain sensitivity for a holistic understanding of the situation and personality of the individual, as well as the individual in interpersonal relationships. He/she can apply the acquired knowledge and skills to specific situations in order to support the personal race, spiritual maturity, and solve problems of life and faith. Based on the interpretation and practical demonstrations, the student will get to know the basic aspects of interpersonal communication (non-verbal, verbal), which he/she will later use in conducting pastoral conversations in various situations. The reception of theory is supported by practice in the form of practical exercises, which gives the course the dimension of experiential teaching. In the discussion on the work The Wounded Healer, the student learns the specifics of pastoral work in the context of the postmodern era, gets the opportunity to formulate the role and identity of the pastorizer, with which he/she can subsequently identify. The student practices the methodology of solving pastoral problems in the context of kerygmatic pastoralism. He/she also verifies and develops his ability to transfer the theoretical knowledge gained so far from the field of biblical sciences, systematic theology (dogmatics, ethics) and practical theology (homiletics, hymnology) into pastoral practice. By conducting a pastoral interview, he/she verifies his abilities by using various methods of conducting a pastoral interview, while developing pastoral competencies.

Other topics covered in the subject of philosophy of religion include: the method, subject matter, and content of philosophy of religion; the problem of evil; the relationship of soul (or mind) and body; religious language; religious diversity and interreligious dialogue; religion and political theory; the concept of God (omnipotence, omniscience, power, eternity); and finally, the relationship between science and faith.
