- d) a list of published works with full bibliographical data and unpublished scientific works and performances of the PhD student, as well as reviews of them and, where appropriate, testimonials about them,
- (e) a justification of the differences between the original dissertation and the submitted dissertation, if the doctoral candidate submits a new dissertation in the same field of doctoral study after an unsuccessful defence.
- f) confirmation from the editorial board of the acceptance of the scientific thesis for publication, if it is a scientific thesis accepted for publication.

The dissertation shall be assessed by three/three referees. At the end of the written assessment, the referee(s) shall comment on whether he/she recommends the thesis for defence and shall propose a pass or fail classification.

- a) the objectives of the dissertation,
- b) the theoretical foundations of the dissertation,
- c) the current state of knowledge on the dissertation topic,
- (d) an analysis of the methodological approach to the dissertation topic; and
- (e) the state of the dissertation work in progress.

The thesis for the doctoral examination is assessed by an opponent, who draws up a written assessment and proposes its assessment with a pass or fail classification grade. The PhD student has the right to get acquainted with the assessment at the latest three working days before the date of the doctoral examination.

The doctoral examination and the announcement of its results shall be public.

The doctoral examination shall be evaluated as a whole with a pass or fail classification. The individual parts of the doctoral examination shall not be assessed separately. If a PhD student has been assessed as failing in the doctoral examination, he/she shall be entitled to one marking period. He/she may take the doctoral examination by at the earliest three months after the doctoral examination in which he/she failed, but at the latest by the end of the penultimate year of the standard length of the PhD studies. A failing grade in the doctoral examination shall be a reason for the PhD student's exclusion from studies.

The target group is a defined group of students. It complements textbooks and is necessary for the quality and effectiveness of educational activities.

Learning outcomes:

The student will demonstrate a comprehensive knowledge of the given thematic unit and the relevant area of research by elaborating the above pedagogical output. He/she will also apply his/her didactic skills and experience from his/her own studies and from teaching first and possibly also second level students. The outcome is a test of the student's ability to critically select and summarise knowledge, to present it in a systematic and appropriate stylistic manner. In the case of an output

Learning outcomes:

The student will become familiar with the basic concepts and problems of historiography of the 19th and 20th centuries and with the tendencies of contemporary historiography. The course develops the ability to approach historical narratives critically, and not at all only in terms of 20th-century history.

Class syllabus:

- 1. Brief overview of the history of historiography, explanation of the concepts: what is the difference between the past and history and what is the relationship between them. How historiography has changed: from myths, chronicles and annals through and syntheses of national history to critical historical analysis and non-national history.
- 2. The shapes and forms of history: history as narrative vs. history as critical analysis of social phenomena. Genres of history: from history of states and nations, political parties and wars to history of regimes, economic systems, social phenomena, ideologies and power; from biographies of rulers and national heroes to social biographies; from macro-history to micro-history; from the history of politics to the history of everyday life; from the history of events to the history of concepts and ideas.
- 3. The social purpose of history I.: What is history for? Historia Magistra Vitae is history really a source of instruction? The uses and abuses of history in the public sphere. The benefits and harms of history in the 20th and 21st centuries: history as an instrument for legitimising regimes, territorial claims, policies, etc.; history as an instrument of identity politics, inclusion and delimitation. Related phenomena: collective memory, remembrance and tradition.

- 4. Social purpose of history II: National history, corporate and business history, community history what do they have in common? What good is the history of the toilet or the history of blood? History as a source of aesthetic experience? Attempts to radically rethink the function of history in the life of complex societies in the 21st century. History outside the study room: historical films and documentaries, "living history", computer games, etc.
- 5. History and Religion I.: Why does it make sense to study the history of religion? What is the difference between history of the church and religious history? How does historiography cooperate with other social sciences in the study of religion (sociology, anthropology)? How has the study of religion changed after the universal validity of the secularization narrative has been challenged?
- 6. History and Religion II. Memory, Identity and History: The Martyr Jozef Tiso. How was the image of Jozef Tiso as a martyr created and nurtured? What role did the various components and individual actors within the Roman Catholic Church play in this regard? What role did non-church actors play? What is happening to this image today?
- 7. Women in History I: How has historiography's approach to women changed? What role has historiography played in the creation of myths? How do official ideas affect the real status of women? How has the image of the ideal woman changed across recent Slovak history?
- 8. Women in History II: Managed Ignorance and Forgetting. Censorship, self-censorship, palimpsests and new coatings. You didn't live then, so don't talk. What were the witnesses of the time allowed to know? How was the dissemination of information restricted and circumvented? How does the information policy of the time affect today's memories? What will influence memories of today?
- 10. Where did history happen? Borders, migrations, transfers. On what decisions did people change residence and workplace? What opportunities did they have to travel? What strangers might they have encountered at home? What contacts did they maintain with foreign countries? What impact did this have on social hierarchies?
- 11. Where is history visible? Public space as a formative space of memory. Bratislava as capital, Slovak city, proletarian city, old and new... What we remembered and what we remember in the city. Guest: Elena Mannová.
- 12. How to catch a historian? Examples of erroneous practice. What affects the quality of the historian's work? What mistakes can even a layman notice? Presentation and discussion.

They understand the issue of gender dimensions of science in its various aspects and levels. They are able to apply a gender perspective in own research.

- 10. Production of knowledge and gender difference. The gender division of research labour.
- 11. "Gender" as an analytical tool, the methodological function of the category of gender.
- 12. Gender perspective in research. Gender-neutral versus gender-sensitive research.
