Course requirements: a) during the semester (40 points): approximately in the middle of the semester, a written test on selected topics (40 points) b) in the examination period (60 points): a written essay on a selected topic. Grading scale: 0-59%-FX, 60-67%-E, 68-75%-D, 76-83%-C, 84-91%-B, 92-100%-A The teacher will accept a maximum of two absences with documentation. The exact date for continuous evaluation and the topic of the paper will be announced at the beginning of the semester. The deadlines for the final essay will be announced through AIS no later than in the last week of the instruction period. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 40/60	
Learning outcomes: The course introduces students to the main theories that explain voting behavior in different types of electoral systems. At the same time, the course draws upon practical examples how individual theories can be tested using empirical data. After successful completion of the course, students are able to independently analyze possible influences on voter behavior, and also evaluate the credibility of preference surveys.
