The student may have a maximum of one absence during the semester without documents and must achieve a minimum of 60% success rate in all parts of the evaluation. They may be admitted to the oral test only if they meet all the required conditions of the continuous evaluation. Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant assessment. They will expand their vocabulary and knowledge of phraseology. They are able to understand longer written and oral speeches of a specialized character, they can argue and they can express themselves promptly on a specific topic in a discussion.

Course requirements: During the semester, two tests checking from the theoretical and practical point of view the grammatical phenomena covered (15%), two written homework assignments on focused on the applicability of grammatical phenomena (15%), and a paper on a comparative linguistic topic, e.g. Pronouns in Bulgarian and Slovak, Past verb tenses in Bulgarian and Slovak, Neologisms in Bulgarian and Slovak, etc. (20%) are required. In the exam period, a final test (35%) and an oral exam (15%) aimed at testing the knowledge of Bulgarian grammar in comparison with Slovak grammar is required. In all parts of the assessment students must achieve a minimum of 60% pass rate. Learning outcomes: After completing the course, students have knowledge of the basic issues of confrontational analysis of texts at the level of all particular linguistic levels. From the theoretical and practical point of view, they are able to specify and differentiate the linguistic system of the Bulgarian standard language in comparison with the Slovak language. They are able to analyse Bulgarian-Slovak linguistic phenomena in depth, they are able to apply the acquired knowledge about the correspondences and differences between Bulgarian and Slovak on all linguistic levels. They have knowledge of the dynamics in the development of contemporary Bulgarian in confrontation with Slovak.

<p>Course requirements:</p> <p>The student can take the state exam a) after obtaining at least such number of credits that after obtaining credits for successful completion of state exams, they achieve the necessary number of credits for the proper completion of studies, b) after successful completion of compulsory subjects, compulsory elective subjects, and elective subjects in the composition determined by the study program, c) after fulfilling the student's obligations arising from § 71, par. 3 letter b of the Higher Education Act, d) if no disciplinary action is taken against them. Successful completion of the state exam is one of the conditions for successful completion of the study program. The subject of the state exam is evaluated by the committee for state exams using the grading scale A-FX. <p>Learning outcomes:</p> <p>After passing the state exam in the subject of History of Two Slavic Literatures in the Context of a Wider Cultural Area (selected according to the profile focus of their studies) in the Slavic Studies (2nd degree) study programme, students have comprehensively mastered the issue of the state exam in the context of all established areas. They have extensive knowledge about the issues</p>	

of comparative literature, inter-literary relations and the reception of Bulgarian/Croatian/Polish/Slovene/Serbian literature in Slovakia, as well as that of Slovak literature in a chosen linguistic and cultural area. They are considerably well versed in the history of Bulgarian/Croatian/Polish/Slovene/Serbian literature, recognize all the particularities of the culture of the chosen language area and can use this knowledge creatively when interpreting and analyzing literary works, as well as in literary-critical reflections on the contemporary literary production.

Class syllabus:

The student takes the exam in two literatures that have been selected according to the profile focus of their studies, while in both of these literatures, they must pass both the written and the oral part of the state exam.

The written part consists of a test with both open and single-choice questions, and typically takes place one day before the oral part of the exam. The dates of the written and oral parts are announced in advance through the department's website.

When taking the oral part, the student will receive one question from each of the select literatures. Questions are assigned in writing and anonymously, either in the form a random selection from printed questions or produced by a generator. The examination committee will give the student reasonable time to prepare an oral answer to the question. The student presents the prepared answer to the question in front of the examination committee and answers all additional questions.

After the student finishes their answer, the examination committee decides on the results of the state exam in a closed session of the examination committee. The course of the state exam and the announcement of its results are public. During the announcement of the results, the committee informs the student about the results of the written and oral parts of the state exam and informs them of the final mark for the subject of the state exam.

In accordance with the faculty's study regulations (VP 5/2020, Art. 15), the framework dates of state examinations are established by the Dean in accordance with the faculty schedule of studies. Departments are obliged to publish their state examination dates on their websites no later than 5 weeks prior to the date of the examinations. The student is to register for the state examination via the academic information system at least three weeks prior to the date of the examination. A student has the right to one regular and two retake dates of the state examination. The regular examination date shall be the one for which the student first applied within the time limit given for the state examinations. If the student has been evaluated with a grade of FX on the regular date of the state examination, the student may take the retake dates of the state examination a) on the following dates for taking the state examinations in the corresponding academic year; or b) on the state examination dates in one of the following academic years in accordance with section 65, paragraph 2 of the Higher Education Act. If a student is unable to attend the date of the state examination or a part thereof for which they has registered due to serious reasons, they must issue a written apology to the chair of the examination board in advance or, at the latest, within three business days after the date of the state examination or any part thereof, if there were serious obstacles preventing them from submitting an apology in advance. The written part consists of a test with open questions as well as multiple-choice questions. The dates of the written and oral parts are published in advance on the Department's website.

For the oral part, the student will be given one question from one language and one question from the other language. The questions are given in writing and anonymously in the form of a random selection from printed questions or a generator. The examination committee will allow the students adequate time to prepare an oral response to the question. The students shall present the prepared answer to the question before the examination committee and shall also answer supplementary questions.

After the students have completed their answer, the Examination Committee shall decide on the results of the State examination, which shall take place in a closed session of the Examination Committee. The state examination and the announcement of its results shall be public. During the announcement of the results, the Board shall inform the students of the results of each component of the national examination and shall communicate to the students the final grade of the subject of the national examination.
