Course requirements: Conditions for passing the course: The course consists of 10 active participations in the class, 10 weekly assignments, 1 pre-registration protocol and 1 ethical approval for research proposal, based on thorough understanding of the required reading. Students are expected to read weekly required readings and apply them to their dissertation projects. The necessary precondition for an active class participation is familiarity with required reading. Students are expected to provide feedback to their colleagues' applications of quantitative methods to dissertation projects. Students are expected to prepare assignments during the semester, in which they will present and discuss weekly topics concerning surveys, experiments, and quantitative content analysis related to their dissertation projects. In the examination period, students are expected to submit an AsPredicted pre-registration protocol (without the analytical plan sections) about surveys, experiments, or quantitative content analysis related to their dissertation projects. In the examination period, students are also expected to submit an ethical approval for research proposal about surveys, experiments, or quantitative content analysis related to their dissertation projects. The proposal should detail in a concise way the purpose of their investigation and procedures, anticipated risk and potential benefits to participants, steps taken to protect the participants, and manner of obtaining participants. Learning outcomes:	

Students will learn how to design, conduct and report surveys, experiments, and quantitative content analysis, how to pre-register their research design, and comply with ethical standards of political science research. The course is practically oriented – applying quantitative research methods to students' dissertation projects will enable them to gain a hands-on experience with exercising rigorous quantitative methodological standards.

Each PhD student will read selected professional books in English + relevant professional articles in English and outputs of his/her colleagues. Each student will prepare a number of position papers (analytical summaries of the readings) - as a presenter and as a discussant. - Presentation (30% of the total mark) - position papers (50% of the total mark). - Weighting of the midterm/final grade: The final grade is based on the following scale: Rating: A: 91-100 points; B: 81-90 points; C: 73-80 points; D: 66-72 points; E: 60-65 points; Fx: 0-59 points	
Learning outcomes: The student will learn the basic concepts of social governance by examining the basic characteristics and dynamics of different approaches to the governance of public issues. Graduates of the course will understand the characteristics of different theories of public policy, which is an important prerequisite for public policy making and decision making in government intervention, as well as in the subsequent management of the implementation of the adopted public policies.	
Class syllabus: The course focuses on the basic concepts of public sector governance and public administration. It aims to learn the trade-offs associated with different approaches to the governance of public issues, as well as the trade-offs associated with decisions to intervene or not to intervene in relevant contexts. It also looks at the relationship between approaches to managing public issues and the effectiveness of interventions adopted. In the course, students will cover the following main areas: - Theory of the State - The main approaches to public sector governance	

- NPM and innovative approaches to public sector governance - Participatory and deliberative democracy - Political-administrative relations - Behavioural approaches to public sector governance

Learning outcomes: Learning outcomes: This is an advanced course for PhD students interested in deepening their understanding of diverse approaches to studying European society and politics and current trends in studying international and transnational phenomena. Upon its completion students will gain insight into real-life work of researchers working with a variety of theoretical and methodological frameworks. The course will have an opening and closing session focused on general nuts and bolts of qualitative methods in dissertation research. The ten substantive sessions will consist of presentations and workshop sessions of faculty and researchers across the FSES departments and/or guest speakers from other local and international departments. Every session will start with an opening presentation and continue with interactive discussion. Students are expected to come to class prepared, having done the required reading and being ready to engage in discussion with the lecturers.
