He also gained an overview of sculptures and ritual objects. He paid special attention to funeral rites and practices based on archaeological data and evidence. Subsequently, he created a thorough picture of the history and religion of the whole region, based solely on the archaeological perspective, ie on the basis of data and their analysis. | |
