Course requirements: Interim assessment: presentations on assigned topics related to the construction of the hero and enemy image (topics will be published via the MS Teams platform at the beginning of the semester) in weeks 5th and 10th for 20 minutes (40 points). Final assessment: a seminar paper of between 8 000 and 10 000 characters and its defense. Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant part of the assessment. Grading scale: A: 100-91, B: 90-83, C: 82-73, D: 72-67, E: 66-60, FX: 59- and below. A maximum of 2 absences are allowed during the semester for which the student has a valid reason. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 40/60	
Learning outcomes: Students will improve their application of the procedures and tools of ethnolinguistics, discourse analysis and semiotics used in the analysis of the images of collective subjects "we" and "they", in the construction of logical and coherent argumentation in the presentation of the results of their research, they will strengthen their habits of working with texts realized in different modes and the ability to critically read the sources. They will learn how to plan and implement teamwork when tackling research questions.	
Class syllabus: The "us" - "them" opposition. Orientation - integration - agonality. Image - stereotype - prejudice - image of the enemy. Linguistic means and strategies in modeling the image of the enemy (polarization, generalization, personalization, metaphorization). The procedure for researching the image of the enemy (tools of ethnolinguistics, semiotics and discourse analysis). Conceptualization of the hero in Russian history (on the pantheon of Soviet heroes, heroes of the post-Soviet period). Practice in the research and interpretation of texts and visual communication on the topic of hero images in the Soviet and post-Soviet periods. Soviet demonology. Stereotypes of the "other" in texts of contemporary media discourse. Images of former "enemies" in post-Soviet media. Practicing	

research and interpretation of texts on the topic of images of enemies in the Soviet and post-Soviet period.

Students must achieve a minimum 60% pass rate in both assessments. Final assessment: seminar paper and its defence. Thesis length: 12000 characters. Deadline for submission of the thesis: maximum two weeks before the end of the examination period. The following will be taken into account in the assessment: (a) the ability to independently select a representative (in relation to the topic under study) text-fragment of discourse(s) for detailed analysis and to pose research questions; b) the ability to quote functionally from the secondary literature; c) adequacy of the methods used; d) the analysis itself and its defence; e) the ability to formulate the information processed with an appropriate degree of explicitness, to structure the text logically and proportionately; (f) formal editing (presentation of bibliographic data in accordance with the guidelines, linguistic level of the work - spelling, stylistics, translation, transcription). Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant part of the assessment. Grading scale: A: 100-91, B: 90-83, C: 82-73, D: 72-67, E: 66-60, FX: 59- and below. A maximum of 2 absences are allowed during the semester for which the student has a valid reason. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 30/80	
Learning outcomes: Students have knowledge of the key concepts of discourse theory, master the basic procedures, principles and instrumentation used in the field of discourse-oriented research and are able to apply them in practice in the analysis of media texts. Their critical thinking skills and media literacy will be deepened. They have a general overview of media in contemporary Russia and media discourse on the topic under study. Their practical habits of presenting the results of their own research will be strengthened.	

Class syllabus:

Media in Russia. From text analysis to discourse analysis. The Limits of Discourse (CDA and the Essex School of Discourse). The procedure of discourse analysis (definition of the corpus, definition of the unit of research, the procedure of the actual analysis of discourse fragments, the position of the analyst). Discourse linguistics (theoretical background, instrumentation and methodology). Precedent phenomenon, its actualization and function in media communication. Metaphor and its function in media communication. Ethnolinguistic tools in discourse analysis. The procedure according to the Vienna school of discourse analysis. Key concepts of the Essex school of discourse (articulation, field of discursivity, elements, moments, excess of meaning, dislocation, antagonism, nodal point, empty signifier). Practice in researching, analysing and interpreting texts as discourse fragments. Practice presenting the results of your research.

Course requirements: Interim assessment: assessed presentation on the assigned topic in the 10th-11th week of the semester (20 points, list of topics is published in MS Teams at the beginning of the semester). In the presentation (15-20 min.), the student introduces the key concepts of the chosen circle/school/representative of semiotics and focuses on their evaluation/contribution to the field, possibly revisitation of their work (he works with relevant secondary literature), or presenting a selected publication by the chosen representative. Criteria for assessing the presentation: structure of the presentation, selection and processing of information, ability to distinguish between relevant and irrelevant sources, oral presentation, ability to answer questions. A minimum of 60 % of the intermediate mark is required for admission to the final examination. Final assessment: written and oral examination (80 points). Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant part of the assessment. Grading scale: A: 100-91, B: 90-83, C: 82-73, D: 72-67, E: 66-60, FX: 59- and below. A maximum of 2 absences are allowed during the semester for which the student has a valid reason. Exam dates will be posted via AIS no later than the last week of the class period. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 20/80	
Learning outcomes: The student has knowledge of the key concepts of semiotics and the possibilities of semiotic analysis of cultural and social phenomena, is able to read critically scientific texts and think abstractly, has stronger practical habits of presenting the results of his/her own research. After completing the course, the student is able to apply semiotic instruments in the analysis of cultural and social phenomena.	
Class syllabus: Semiotics as a scientific discipline. Syntactics, semantics, pragmatics. Sign and models of sign. Classifications of signs: symbol, index and icon. Sign as part of a structure. Paradigmatic and	

syntagmatic relations. Denotation and connotation. Code and typology of codes. Training in interpretation skills. Functions of language. Specifics of social semiotics. Modus and basics of multimodal analysis. Approaches to the analysis of the semiotics of narrative. Training in presentation skills.

Departments are obliged to publish the dates of their state exams on the website no later than 5 weeks before they take place. The student registers for the state exam through the academic information system (AIS) at least three weeks before it takes place. The student is entitled to one regular and two resist attempts of the state exam. The regular attempt is the one for which the student applied for the first time within the deadline set for state exams. If the student was evaluated with the FX mark on the regular attempt of the state exam, the student may take resist of the state exam a) on the following dates assigned for state examinations in the relevant academic year or b) on the dates assigned for state examinations in one of the following academic years in accordance with § 65, par. 2 of the Higher Education Act. If the student is unable to come on the day of the state exam for which they have registered on serious grounds, they are obliged to apologize in writing to the chairman of the examination committee in advance or no later than three working days after the date of the state examination or its part, if there were serious obstacles that prevented them to do so in advance. If the student does not attend the state examination or its part without an excuse within the specified period, or if the chairman of the examination committee does not accept their excuse, they are assessed with the FX grade from that attempt of the state exam.
