Course requirements: a) during the teaching part (continuously) presentation on a selected topic from the covered subject (30 points), active participation in classes (10 points), b) in the examination period: colloquium (60 points). Criteria for grading the colloquium: independent structured answer with deep understanding - A, independent structured answer - B, independent answer - C, answer as a comprehensive answer to the examiner's questions - D, answer as an answer to the examiner's questions - E. The student must achieve at least a 60% success rate in all parts of the course. The instructor will accept 2 absences. Dates for the oral colloquium will be announced via AIS no later than the last week of the teaching session. Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant part of the assessment. Learning outcomes: After successful completion of the course, students have knowledge of the basic circumstances and contexts of cultural history in the 20th century, orient themselves in the different spheres of cultural and social life of Russia in this period. They know the basic tendencies, phenomena and personalities of these spheres in the defined period. With the teacher's guidance, they are able to carry out independent research, read sources critically, synthesise acquired knowledge and present the results of partial research in a structured way.

Course requirements: Interim assessment: assignment (10 points), presentation of research for the term paper in the 11th-12th week of the semester (20 points). Students must achieve a minimum 60% pass rate in both assessments. Final assessment: seminar paper and its defence. Thesis length: 12000 characters. Deadline for submission of the thesis: maximum two weeks before the end of the examination period. The following will be taken into account in the assessment: (a) the ability to independently select a representative (in relation to the topic under study) text-fragment of discourse(s) for detailed analysis and to pose research questions; b) the ability to quote functionally from the secondary literature; c) adequacy of the methods used; d) the analysis itself and its defence; e) the ability to formulate the information processed with an appropriate degree of explicitness, to structure the text logically and proportionately; (f) formal editing (presentation of bibliographic data in accordance with the guidelines, linguistic level of the work - spelling, stylistics, translation, transcription). Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant part of the assessment. Grading scale: A: 100-91, B: 90-83, C: 82-73, D: 72-67, E: 66-60, FX: 59- and below. A maximum of 2 absences are allowed during the semester for which the student has a valid reason. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 30/80	
Learning outcomes: Students have knowledge of the key concepts of discourse theory, master the basic procedures, principles and instrumentation used in the field of discourse-oriented research and are able to apply them in practice in the analysis of media texts. Their critical thinking skills and media literacy will be deepened. They have a general overview of media in contemporary Russia and media discourse on the topic under study. Their practical habits of presenting the results of their own research will be strengthened.	

Class syllabus:

Media in Russia. From text analysis to discourse analysis. The Limits of Discourse (CDA and the Essex School of Discourse). The procedure of discourse analysis (definition of the corpus, definition of the unit of research, the procedure of the actual analysis of discourse fragments, the position of the analyst). Discourse linguistics (theoretical background, instrumentation and methodology). Precedent phenomenon, its actualization and function in media communication. Metaphor and its function in media communication. Ethnolinguistic tools in discourse analysis. The procedure according to the Vienna school of discourse analysis. Key concepts of the Essex school of discourse (articulation, field of discursivity, elements, moments, excess of meaning, dislocation, antagonism, nodal point, empty signifier). Practice in researching, analysing and interpreting texts as discourse fragments. Practice presenting the results of your research.

Course requirements: Interim assessment: assessed presentation on the assigned topic in the 10th-11th week of the semester (20 points, list of topics is published in MS Teams at the beginning of the semester). In the presentation (15-20 min.), the student introduces the key concepts of the chosen circle/school/representative of semiotics and focuses on their evaluation/contribution to the field, possibly revisitation of their work (he works with relevant secondary literature), or presenting a selected publication by the chosen representative. Criteria for assessing the presentation: structure of the presentation, selection and processing of information, ability to distinguish between relevant and irrelevant sources, oral presentation, ability to answer questions. A minimum of 60 % of the intermediate mark is required for admission to the final examination. Final assessment: written and oral examination (80 points). Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant part of the assessment. Grading scale: A: 100-91, B: 90-83, C: 82-73, D: 72-67, E: 66-60, FX: 59- and below. A maximum of 2 absences are allowed during the semester for which the student has a valid reason. Exam dates will be posted via AIS no later than the last week of the class period. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 20/80	
Learning outcomes: The student has knowledge of the key concepts of semiotics and the possibilities of semiotic analysis of cultural and social phenomena, is able to read critically scientific texts and think abstractly, has stronger practical habits of presenting the results of his/her own research. After completing the course, the student is able to apply semiotic instruments in the analysis of cultural and social phenomena.	
Class syllabus: Semiotics as a scientific discipline. Syntactics, semantics, pragmatics. Sign and models of sign. Classifications of signs: symbol, index and icon. Sign as part of a structure. Paradigmatic and	

syntagmatic relations. Denotation and connotation. Code and typology of codes. Training in interpretation skills. Functions of language. Specifics of social semiotics. Modus and basics of multimodal analysis. Approaches to the analysis of the semiotics of narrative. Training in presentation skills.

Course requirements: The state examination may be taken by a student a) after obtaining a minimum number of credits sufficient to achieve the necessary number of credits for the proper completion of studies after obtaining credits for successful completion of the state examinations, b) after successful completion of compulsory courses, compulsory elective courses and elective courses in the structure designated in the study programme, c) after fulfilling the student's obligations stemming from Section 71, paragraph 3, letter b of the Higher Education Act, d) if no disciplinary proceedings are conducted against them. Successful completion of the state examination course is one of the conditions for successful completion of the study programme. The state examination course is evaluated by the examination board with classification grades A to FX. The evaluation of the state examination or part thereof is decided by consensus by the examination board. If the examination board fails to reach a consensus, the marking of the state examination or part thereof shall be decided by voting. In accordance with the faculty's study regulations (VP 5/2020, Art. 15), the framework dates of state examinations are established by the Dean in accordance with the faculty schedule of studies. Departments are obliged to publish their state examination dates on their websites no later than 5 weeks prior to the date of the examinations. The student is to register for the state examination via the academic information system at least three weeks prior to the date of the examination. A student has the right to one regular and two retake dates of the state examination. The regular examination date shall be the one for which the student first applied within the time limit given for the state examinations. If the student has been evaluated with a grade of FX on the regular date of the state examination, the student may take the retake dates of the state examination a) on the following dates for taking the state examinations in the corresponding academic year; or b) on the state examination dates in one of the following academic years in accordance with section 65, paragraph 2 of the Higher Education Act. If a student is unable to attend the date of the state examination or a part thereof for which they has registered due to serious reasons, they must issue a written apology to the chair of the examination board in advance or, at the latest, within three business days after the date of the state examination or any part thereof, if there were serious obstacles preventing them from submitting an apology in advance. If the student does not attend the state examination or any part thereof on the specified date without an explanation, or if the chair of the examination board does not accept the student's apology, the student shall be given a grade of FX for that particular date of the state examination. Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant assessment. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 0/100	
Learning outcomes: After completing the state examination subject Bulgarian Language and Translation, the students handle the matters of the state examination in the context of the specified topics, possess a broad theoretical knowledge of individual translation and interpreting disciplines, know how to compare	

the language systems of Slovak and Bulgarian, can adequately communicate in all language styles (literary, specialized, journalistic, marketing) both in written and oral form. They master all procedures, skills, habits and strategies of literary and specialized translation, consecutive and simultaneous interpretation, achieve a high degree of language competence in Slovak and Bulgarian, as well as a high degree of translation and interpreting competence.

Class syllabus:

The language examination has a written and oral part.

The written part consists of a test with open-ended as well as multiple choice questions and it is normally carried out one day before the oral part. On the day of the written exam, the student also takes the translation and interpreting examinations. The dates of the written and oral parts are to be published in advance on the department's website.

In the oral part, the student will be asked one question. The questions are given in written form and anonymously in the form of a random selection from printed questions or a random generator. The examination board will allow the student adequate time to prepare an oral response to the question. The student shall present the prepared answer to the question to the examination board and shall also answer supplementary questions.

After the student has completed their answer, the examination board shall decide on the results of the state examination, which shall take place in a closed session of the examination board. The state examination and the announcement of its results shall be public. During the announcement of the results, the board informs the student about the results of the written and oral part of the state examination and informs them of the final evaluation of state examination subject.

1. confrontational analysis of differences between Slovak and Bulgarian languages with emphasis on lexicological language level,
2. confrontational analysis of differences between Slovak and Bulgarian languages with emphasis on stylistic language level,
3. application of specific translation practices in translating specialized texts (from Slovak to Bulgarian and from Bulgarian to Slovak) in practice,
4. application of specific interpreting practices in consecutive and simultaneous interpreting (from Slovak to Bulgarian and from Bulgarian to Slovak) in practice,
5. application of knowledge gained from history, culture and literature in the practice of literary translation, i.e. in translation of Bulgarian literary texts into Slovak.

State exam syllabus:

Topics for the examination from Bulgarian language:

1. The place of Bulgarian language among Slavic and Balkan languages.
2. Classification of Bulgarian vowels by place and method of articulation.
3. Classification of Bulgarian consonants by place and method of articulation.
4. Characteristics of parts of speech in Bulgarian and Slovak.
5. Characteristics of Bulgarian nouns in comparison with Slovak. Definite article.
6. Gender, number and gradation of adjectives.
7. Full and short forms of possessive pronouns in Bulgarian.
8. Accusative and dative forms of personal pronouns in Bulgarian.
9. Verb classes and verb tenses in Bulgarian language.
10. Indefinite verb forms in Bulgarian. Types of participles.
11. Expression of the infinitive. Verbal да-constructions.
12. Significance and function of prepositions in Bulgarian in comparison with Slovak.
13. Differentiation of Bulgarian vocabulary in terms of origin.
14. Active and passive lexicon (archaisms, historisms, neologisms).
15. Lexical-semantic relations (synonyms, homonyms, antonyms)

The translation and interpreting examination consists of: • translation of a specialized text into Bulgarian within 1 standard page • translation of a literary text into Slovak within 1 standard page • consecutive interpreting into Slovak • consecutive interpreting into Bulgarian • simultaneous interpreting into Slovak Students will be provided in advance with the thematic areas of the interpreting examination.

In accordance with the faculty's study regulations (VP 5/2020, Art. 15), the framework dates of state examinations are established by the Dean in accordance with the faculty schedule of studies. Departments are obliged to publish their state examination dates on their websites no later than 5 weeks prior to the date of the examinations. The student is to register for the state examination via the academic information system at least three weeks prior to the date of the examination. A student has the right to one regular and two retake dates of the state examination. The regular examination date shall be the one for which the student first applied within the time limit given for the state examinations. If the student has been evaluated with a grade of FX on the regular date of the state examination, the student may take the retake dates of the state examination a) on the following dates for taking the state examinations in the corresponding academic year; or b) on the state examination dates in one of the following academic years in accordance with section 65, paragraph 2 of the Higher Education Act. literature in Slovakia, as well as Slovak literature in Bulgaria. They are familiar with the historical matters of the studied linguistic and cultural area in a broader European context. They are well versed in the history of Bulgarian literature, know all the specifics of Bulgarian culture and are able to use them creatively in the interpretation and analysis of literary works, as well as in literary-critical reflection on current literary production.

Class syllabus:

The examination from literature has a written and an oral part.

The written part consists of a test with open-ended as well as multiple choice questions and it is normally carried out one day before the oral part. The dates of the written and oral parts are to be published in advance on the department's website.

In the oral part, the student will be asked one question. The questions are given in written form and anonymously in the form of a random selection from printed questions or a random generator. The examination board will allow the student adequate time to prepare an oral response to the question. The student shall present the prepared answer to the question to the examination board and shall also answer supplementary questions.

After the student has completed their answer, the examination board shall decide on the results of the state examination, which shall take place in a closed session of the examination board. The state examination and the announcement of its results shall be public. During the announcement of the results, the board informs the student about the results of the written and oral parts of the state examination and informs them of the final evaluation of state examination subject.

The student is able to grasp and comment on a scientific metatext (from domains of theory of literature, psychoanalysis, philosophy, esthetics), specific in its approach to literature. The student is capable of selecting aspects of the text in a way enabling him/her to use those in their own interpretation of a literary text or in their own reflection on art. The student is aware of the specifics of exact scientific methods as well as of more open approaches to literature. He/she has	

basic knowledge about developing his/her own competencies of reading and writing with aspects from various discussed metatexts.

Class syllabus:

The course helps in developing of reading and writing competencies. It is aimed at an overview of selected approaches to literature in theory of literature, psychoanalysis, philosophy, and esthetics, in international and domestic culture contexts. The course is executed as a set of interactive lectures.

Topics are:

1. Positivism and its detailed study of author's biography.
2. Formalism and its benefits in more complex interpretation of literary works.
3. „Antirealism“ in essays related to avantgarde art.
4. Psychoanalysis and its insight into functions of libido in the process of creating text..
5. Psychoanalytical insights into existential writing longing to find the meaning of life.
6. Phenomenology and its study of forces of nature (mainly fire and water) in imagination.
7. Structuralism, its “story” in Russian, French, Czech and Slovak context.
8. Structuralist analysis of poetry and prose.
9. Semiology and its suggestions on distancing from lies and power of language.
10. Relationship between terms semiotics and semiology.
11. Postmodern philosophy and esthetics, its insight in approach to art and life.
12. Cognitive sciences in study of poetry and prose.
13. Aspect of gender in history of literature and in its interpretation.

During selected parts of the lectures, Slovak and world poetry and prose will be interpreted and interactively discussed. Visual artworks will also be presented, since one of the goals of the course is to show how science connects to the power of art.

In the master's study programmes, the state examination consists only of the defence of the Master's thesis. The student chooses the department as a training centre which corresponds to the discipline within which he/she wants to write the final thesis. He/she reports this choice by the deadline set by the department, provided that he/she is able to find a supervisor and a suitable topic in the relevant department. For the successful defence of the Master's thesis as the subject of the state examination in the master's degree programmes conducted at the Department of British and American Studies, students will receive credits according to the current study plan (currently 15 credits). Requirements for the admission to the defence are as follows: - fulfillment of the requirements of the study plan concerning the prescribed composition of courses and their credit value so that after awarding the credits for the state examination the student obtains the required number of credits for the master's degree; - submission of the Master's thesis (electronically via the academic information system AIS) by the thesis submission deadline corresponding to the relevant state examination period according to the academic year schedule set by the faculty. The thesis is evaluated by the standard grading scale (0-59% -FX, 60-67% -E, 68-75% -D, 76-83% -C, 84-91% -B, 92-100% -A) by the supervisor of the thesis and the designated opponent in the assessment reports, which are available to the student no later than 3 working days before the state examination. The supervisor's report shall also include the percentage of compliance results from the originality check protocols (CRZP, Theses), which must be explicitly evaluated by the supervisor with the wording "the thesis shows/does not show signs of plagiarism". The subject of the state exam is evaluated by the committee for state exams using the grading scale A-FX. The evaluation of the state examination or its part is decided by the examination committee by consensus. If the examination committee does not reach a consensus, the evaluation of the state examination or its part is decided by voting. On the basis of the wording of the study regulations of the faculty (Internal Rules and Regulations 5/2020, Art. 15), the framework dates of state examinations are set by the dean in accordance with the faculty's academic schedule. Departments are obliged to publish the dates of their state exams on the website no later than 5 weeks before they take place. The student registers for the state exam through the academic information system (AIS) at least three weeks before it takes place. The student is entitled to one regular and two resist attempts of the state exam. The regular attempt is the one for which the student applied for the first time within the deadline set for state exams. If the student was evaluated with the FX mark on the regular attempt of the state exam, the student may take resist of the state exam a) on the following dates assigned for state examinations in the relevant academic year or b) on the dates assigned for state examinations in one of the following academic years in accordance with § 65, par. 2 of the Higher Education Act. If the student is unable to come on the day of the state exam for which they have registered on serious grounds, they are obliged to apologize in writing to the chairman of the examination committee in advance or no later than three working days after the date of the state examination or its part, if there were serious obstacles that prevented them to do so in advance. If the student does not attend the state examination or its part without an excuse within the specified period, or if the chairman of the examination committee does not accept their excuse, they are assessed with the FX grade from that attempt of the state exam.
