Course requirements: a) during the teaching part (continuously) presentation on a selected topic from the covered subject (30 points), active participation in classes (10 points), b) in the examination period: colloquium (60 points). Criteria for grading the colloquium: independent structured answer with deep understanding - A, independent structured answer - B, independent answer - C, answer as a comprehensive answer to the examiner's questions - D, answer as an answer to the examiner's questions - E. The student must achieve at least a 60% success rate in all parts of the course. The instructor will accept 2 absences. Dates for the oral colloquium will be announced via AIS no later than the last week of the teaching session. Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant part of the assessment. Learning outcomes: After successful completion of the course, students have knowledge of the basic circumstances and contexts of cultural history in the 20th century, orient themselves in the different spheres of cultural and social life of Russia in this period. They know the basic tendencies, phenomena and personalities of these spheres in the defined period. With the teacher's guidance, they are able to carry out independent research, read sources critically, synthesise acquired knowledge and present the results of partial research in a structured way.

Course requirements: Interim assessment: assignment (10 points), presentation of research for the term paper in the 11th-12th week of the semester (20 points). Students must achieve a minimum 60% pass rate in both assessments. Final assessment: seminar paper and its defence. Thesis length: 12000 characters. Deadline for submission of the thesis: maximum two weeks before the end of the examination period. The following will be taken into account in the assessment: (a) the ability to independently select a representative (in relation to the topic under study) text-fragment of discourse(s) for detailed analysis and to pose research questions; b) the ability to quote functionally from the secondary literature; c) adequacy of the methods used; d) the analysis itself and its defence; e) the ability to formulate the information processed with an appropriate degree of explicitness, to structure the text logically and proportionately; (f) formal editing (presentation of bibliographic data in accordance with the guidelines, linguistic level of the work - spelling, stylistics, translation, transcription). Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant part of the assessment. Grading scale: A: 100-91, B: 90-83, C: 82-73, D: 72-67, E: 66-60, FX: 59- and below. A maximum of 2 absences are allowed during the semester for which the student has a valid reason. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 30/80	
Learning outcomes: Students have knowledge of the key concepts of discourse theory, master the basic procedures, principles and instrumentation used in the field of discourse-oriented research and are able to apply them in practice in the analysis of media texts. Their critical thinking skills and media literacy will be deepened. They have a general overview of media in contemporary Russia and media discourse on the topic under study. Their practical habits of presenting the results of their own research will be strengthened.	

Class syllabus:

Media in Russia. From text analysis to discourse analysis. The Limits of Discourse (CDA and the Essex School of Discourse). The procedure of discourse analysis (definition of the corpus, definition of the unit of research, the procedure of the actual analysis of discourse fragments, the position of the analyst). Discourse linguistics (theoretical background, instrumentation and methodology). Precedent phenomenon, its actualization and function in media communication. Metaphor and its function in media communication. Ethnolinguistic tools in discourse analysis. The procedure according to the Vienna school of discourse analysis. Key concepts of the Essex school of discourse (articulation, field of discursivity, elements, moments, excess of meaning, dislocation, antagonism, nodal point, empty signifier). Practice in researching, analysing and interpreting texts as discourse fragments. Practice presenting the results of your research.

Course requirements: a) During the semester, the student will receive 30 points of the overall evaluation on a continuous basis based on the submission of texts they write during the semester, b) in the examination period, the student will receive 70 points for the final oral exam, which will be held in the form of a colloquium. The student will prepare an argumentation on a pre-selected topic and present it to the other students, following the principles of argumentation learned during the semester. The argumentation topics are updated regularly. Credits will not be awarded to students who receive less than 60 points of the overall evaluation based on the average calculated from the work in class and the final written paper. Grading scale: 100-90: A 89-85: B 84-75: C 74-70: D 69-60: E 59-0: FX The teachers will accept a maximum of two absences. The date and topics of the argumentation will be announced through AIS no later than in the last week of the instruction period. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 30/70	
Learning outcomes: The student masters the basic methods and linguistic devices of argumentation and can use textual analysis to detect and identify the author's argumentative/communicative intent. The student can apply the argumentation methods to their own written and oral speeches. The student is familiar with the basic structure of argumentation and the techniques of its creation. The student can clearly and persuasively articulate the introduction and conclusion of an argumentation as well as convincingly construct an argument. The student thinks about topics in theses and antitheses, that is, considers a	

topic in its positive and negative aspects, and can construct a persuasive argumentation in written and oral speeches.

Course requirements: Interim assessment: assessed presentation on the assigned topic in the 10th-11th week of the semester (20 points, list of topics is published in MS Teams at the beginning of the semester). In the presentation (15-20 min.), the student introduces the key concepts of the chosen circle/school/representative of semiotics and focuses on their evaluation/contribution to the field, possibly revisitation of their work (he works with relevant secondary literature), or presenting a selected publication by the chosen representative. Criteria for assessing the presentation: structure of the presentation, selection and processing of information, ability to distinguish between relevant and irrelevant sources, oral presentation, ability to answer questions. A minimum of 60 % of the intermediate mark is required for admission to the final examination. Final assessment: written and oral examination (80 points). Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant part of the assessment. Grading scale: A: 100-91, B: 90-83, C: 82-73, D: 72-67, E: 66-60, FX: 59- and below. A maximum of 2 absences are allowed during the semester for which the student has a valid reason. Exam dates will be posted via AIS no later than the last week of the class period. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 20/80	
Learning outcomes: The student has knowledge of the key concepts of semiotics and the possibilities of semiotic analysis of cultural and social phenomena, is able to read critically scientific texts and think abstractly, has stronger practical habits of presenting the results of his/her own research. After completing the course, the student is able to apply semiotic instruments in the analysis of cultural and social phenomena.

On an ongoing basis, the student will receive 4 marks for these items, which will be used as the basis for the final assessment at the end of the semester. The exact dates of the midterm evaluation will be announced at the beginning of the semester. The student must achieve at least a 60% pass rate in all parts of the assessment. Two absences are allowed if the reason for the absence is proven. Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant part of the assessment. Grading scale: A: 100-91, B: 90-83, C: 82-73, D: 72-67, E: 66-60, FX: 59- and below. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 100/0	
Learning outcomes: A student who successfully completes the course has mastered the specifics of interpreting for individuals who find themselves in a crisis situation. Depending on the communicative context, the student is able to decide independently on a particular interpreting strategy and procedure. He/she is familiar with lexical expressions common in the fields of health, law, migration and social security. Knows the principles of interpreter behaviour in ethically sensitive situations.

The student is able to grasp and comment on a scientific metatext (from domains of theory of literature, psychoanalysis, philosophy, esthetics), specific in its approach to literature. The student is capable of selecting aspects of the text in a way enabling him/her to use those in their own interpretation of a literary text or in their own reflection on art. The student is aware of the specifics of exact scientific methods as well as of more open approaches to literature. He/she has	

basic knowledge about developing his/her own competencies of reading and writing with aspects from various discussed metatexts.

Class syllabus:

The course helps in developing of reading and writing competencies. It is aimed at an overview of selected approaches to literature in theory of literature, psychoanalysis, philosophy, and esthetics, in international and domestic culture contexts. The course is executed as a set of interactive lectures.

Topics are:

1. Positivism and its detailed study of author's biography.
2. Formalism and its benefits in more complex interpretation of literary works.
3. „Antirealism“ in essays related to avantgarde art.
4. Psychoanalysis and its insight into functions of libido in the process of creating text..
5. Psychoanalytical insights into existential writing longing to find the meaning of life.
6. Phenomenology and its study of forces of nature (mainly fire and water) in imagination.
7. Structuralism, its “story” in Russian, French, Czech and Slovak context.
8. Structuralist analysis of poetry and prose.
9. Semiology and its suggestions on distancing from lies and power of language.
10. Relationship between terms semiotics and semiology.
11. Postmodern philosophy and esthetics, its insight in approach to art and life.
12. Cognitive sciences in study of poetry and prose.
13. Aspect of gender in history of literature and in its interpretation.

During selected parts of the lectures, Slovak and world poetry and prose will be interpreted and interactively discussed. Visual artworks will also be presented, since one of the goals of the course is to show how science connects to the power of art.

The student registers for the state exam through the academic information system (AIS) at least three weeks before it takes place. The student is entitled to one regular and two resit attempts of the state exam. The regular attempt is the one for which the student applied for the first time within the deadline set for state exams. If the student was evaluated with the FX mark on the regular attempt of the state exam, the student may take resits of the state exam a) on the following dates assigned for state examinations in the relevant academic year or b) on the dates assigned for state examinations in one of the following academic years in accordance with § 65, par. 2 of the Higher Education Act. Course requirements: a) during the semester, the student will receive 50 points of the overall evaluation on a continuous basis based on active participation in class, preparation of assignments and exercises in the Aranea language corpora as well as other required work in the seminar that arises from the material covered, b) in the examination period, the student will receive 50 points for the final written work based on the work with the corpus and the analysis of the search results. The student will submit this work in the examination period. The student will be given a choice of topic to work on as instructed by the teacher in the examination period. The topics of the written work are updated regularly. Credits will not be awarded to students who receive less than 60 points of the overall evaluation based on the average calculated from the work class and the final written paper. Learning outcomes: After successfully completing the course, the student can work independently with the Aranea language corpora, focusing on French and Slovak, but may extend the corpus work to other languages given that they have acquired basic universal skills with the tool. They may also use the acquired knowledge when working with other electronic language corpora. Working with the Aranea corpora is aimed at deepening the knowledge and skills in the context of practical proficiency in the French language, so the student sees the corpus as a very good tool in the work of a translator/interpreter (creating glossaries, checking phenomena in context,	

comparing translation solutions in the corpus, etc.), as well as in the work of a foreign language teacher, where the language corpus has a variety of uses (creating exercises, illustrative material, reflexive grammar, etc.).

Class syllabus:

1. The French article and its symptomatic use: analysis of the context of the occurrence of article and the production of comparative materials
2. Creation of translation exercises
3. Adjective position and change of meaning
4. Working with the Slovak corpus: comparison/translation
5. Gender and change of noun meaning, creation of semantic fields through collocations, preparation of didactic materials
6. French past tenses in translation into Slovak
7. The question of verbal aspect, observation of adverbs and verbs
8. Verb and preposition (creation of glossaries of prepositional constructions with verb and observation of their meanings, use of multilevel frequency distribution, preparation of didactic materials)
9. Analysis of the occurrence of neologisms and anglicisms in the Slovak and French corpus
10. Substandard vocabulary in French
11. Analysis of established phrases in French
12. Creation of glossaries of idioms, translation exercises, preparation of didactic materials
