Learning outcomes: The course aims to provide a broad overview of the origins of the Slavic settlement of the Central Danubian region in the context of the development of its settlement starting from the period of the Migration period. They will also have knowledge of the Slavic and Avar communities inhabiting the territory of the Central Danube region during the Avar period. Although the expert interpretation is partly based on written sources, the focus is on the interpretation of archaeological findings – material culture. Completion of this course will provide students with the prerequisites for a successful solution of research problems connected with the older history of the Central Danubian region.

Assessment will involve a short PowerPoint presentation and subsequent gradable 15-page essay submission which will allow students a very broad range of subject matter and thematic choice. Thematic questions. Choose one from the following themes, in each case defining a set of prehistoric cultural material: 1. What evidence is there in your chosen culture for aesthetic sensibility and a range of judgments in relation to a particular art medium/or particular sense category? 2. What data can be used for finding out about how 'creativity' was conceptualized in the culture in question/does the concept 'art' make sense in the chosen context? 3. What were the sources of stylistic change over space and or time in a closely defined distributional sequence of material/what kind of reality lies behind style concepts? 4. How can we identify the 'referent domain', and how do iconic and symbolic levels relate to one another?	
Learning outcomes: This course provides an illustrated introduction to prehistoric and early art in global perspective. It aims to develop methodological, theoretical and critical skills which will deepen students' knowledge and appreciation of art in general, ancient and modern. The course necessarily mainly focusses on visual and material art, while referring to a broader range of aesthetic endeavour (music, dance, etc) where there is surviving evidence. The course is global with some emphasis on Old	

World and particularly European prehistory. While being introduced to the range of surviving artistic material, from the evolutionary and Palaeolithic periods through to the rise of the first civilizations and the age of empires, the student will learn to tackle issues such as the aesthetic instinct in animals, the emergence of cognitive capacities, the nature of visual communication and symbolism, cross-cultural regularities in aesthetic experience, the emergence of the artist as a persona, and so on. Students will learn about semiotic and communication theory, artists and audiences, and become aware of the meanings of specific terms such as redundancy, salience, representation, abstract, iconic, symbolic, iconographic, iconological, and so on.

2. Reading and viewing art: the basics
3. The biological and cultural origins of art and the Creative explosion
4. Venus figurines and the Eurasian Palaeolithic
5. Pottery, ethnicity, decoration, and identity
6. Status, power, and metalwork: the Copper and Bronze Ages
7. Narrative and figural arts of the early empires
8. The emergence of the Animal Style and the origins of heraldry
9. Celtic La Tène art
10. Solving the mystery of the Gundestrup cauldron

On successful completion of this course, a student should have an overview of the principal cultures and regions in ancient North America and be able to provide examples of the diversity of life ways of ancient North Americans. This course will help students to increase skills in critical thinking, reading, and communicating. Students will also have gained a better understanding of the diversity of cultures, lifeways, and archaeological research in world prehistory.
