Course requirements: a) during the semester a paper (30%). Topics, e.g.: Dugonics' Etelka as translation and adaptation, new poetic forms - authors and works, a new view of translation (Batsányi), specifics of a new literary language, the (Hungarian) ballad, etc. b) during the examination period: written test (70%). The student will be admitted to the test only with a minimum of 10% from continuous evaluation. Violation of academic ethics will be punished, and the student will lose all the received points in the relevant assessment. Grading scale: A: 100% - 92% B: 91% - 84% C: 83% - 76% D: 75% - 68% E: 67% - 60% FX: 59% - 0%. The teacher will accept a maximum of 2 absences with documentation. The exact date for continuous evaluation and the topic of the paper will be announced at the beginning of the semester. The dates for the final test will be announced through AIS no later than in the last week of the instruction period. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 30/70	
Learning outcomes: To deepen the knowledge of authors and works or specifics of the canon of Hungarian literature of the 19th century, also in the broader context of the time (both Hungarian and European). The student should be able to distinguish the phenomena and (formal-content) specifics of Enlightenment Classicism and Romanticism as such and apply the acquired knowledge (e.g. in the interpretation of texts, phenomena, in the discovery of contexts and their overlaps).

Course requirements: a) during the teaching part (continuously) a paper (30%) on a selected topic from the history of 20th century Hungarian literature, e.g.: the work of individual authors (e.g. Gyula Illyés, Endre Gelléri Andor, Géza Csáth, etc.), analysis of literary works, magazine culture of the time, intermedial aspects of contemporary literature. b) in the examination period: written test (70%) The condition for admission to the examination is the achievement of at least 10% of the intermediate mark. Violation of academic ethics will result in the cancellation of the points obtained in the respective item The student will be required to complete the item in question in the appropriate marking item. Grading Scale: A: 100% - 92% B: 91% - 84% C: 83% - 76% D: 75% - 68% E: 67% - 60% FX: 59% - 0%. Credit will not be awarded to a student who does not master 60% of the curriculum. Instructors will accept a maximum of 2 absences with documented evidence. The exact date and topic of the midterm evaluation will be announced at the beginning of the semester. Examination dates will be published via AIS no later than the last week of the The last day of the teaching period. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 30/70.	
Learning outcomes: After successful completion of the course, the student will have knowledge of the development of 20th century Hungarian literature, will know adequate artistic trends (Modernism, Art Nouveau, Symbolism, Impressionism, Expressionism, Surrealism, etc.), the most important literary genres,	

the socio-cultural aspects of the period, and will acquire skills in the analysis of literary works of Hungarian Modernism. He will have a thorough knowledge of the key works and the work of key authors (e.g. Endre Ady, Mihály Babits, Dezső Kosztolányi, Zsigmond Móricz, Lajos Kassák, etc.) of the period.

Course requirements: 30% of the grade consists of a terminology test that students take during the semester. 70% of the grade consists of a term research paper and its presentation. Credit will not be awarded to a student who receives less than 60% of the total grade. The student will be allowed a maximum of 2 absences with documentation. Grading scale: A: 100-92; B: 91-84; C: 83-76; D: 75-68; E: 67-60; FX: 59 and less. The exact date and topics of the midterm assessment will be announced at the beginning of the semester. Examination dates will be announced through AIS no later than the last week of the instruction period. Violation of academic ethics will result in the loss of all received points in the relevant assessment. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 30/70	
Learning outcomes: Students will consolidate their linguistic and translational competences, expand specific vocabulary from the thematic areas that they may encounter during community or guide interpreting from and into Spanish. They will become familiar with working with electronic dictionaries, corpora and terminology databases, and learn how to create glossaries. They will practise interpreting from a letter on actual journalistic texts, while improving their general overview of current events in Hispanophone countries. They will become familiar with basic terminology of international relations and European institutions.	
Class syllabus: 1. Introduction to the major Slovak and Spanish terminology databases and corpora. Explanation of the basic strategies for the creation and use of glossaries in technical translation and interpreting. 2. Reading of popular science texts and simpler technical texts focused on the economy, labour market, migration, health system, international relations and European institutions. 3. Exercises aimed at expanding vocabulary in the above-mentioned subject areas. 4. Interpreting from a letter. 5. Individual glossary creation. 6. Reading translational studies focused on specific problems of professional translation and interpreting.	

7. Understanding the text - working with technical dictionaries (explanatory, bilingual, terminological).
8. Issues of searching for equivalents (terms) in the mother tongue - training in searching and consultation of secondary technical literature.
9. Expansion of active vocabulary, training of the most common scientific and technical terms.
10. Text translation - emphasis on accuracy of technical translation.
11. Training in the translation of scientific/popular science texts from area of natural science.

Learning outcomes: After successfully completing the course, the student has mastered the basic requirements of writing a scientific text in compliance with the rules of academic ethics. The student masters the theory of citing and referencing used sources and has skills in creating bibliographic references and citations. The student understands the principles of what makes up the formal and content side of the bachelor's thesis depending on the internal quality system of Comenius University. He understands the causes of plagiarism, know its various types, and can avoid them. The student has sufficient information competencies to acquire, process, and interpret basic scientific literature.	
Class syllabus: 1. Theory of citing and referencing used sources (basic terms, standards). 2. Creation of bibliographic references (standard, electronic, non-book documents). 3. Citation techniques. 4. Reference management software (types, functions, restrictions). 5. Academic ethics and integrity, plagiarism, types of plagiarism. 6. Main principles of creating a scientific text (creating both the content and formal sides, problems). 7. Formal adjustments of the thesis 8. Main parts of the thesis: table of contents, sequence of parts, writing (preface, abstract, introduction, conclusion). 9. Course requirements: All matters pertaining to state examination are set out in Article 14 of the Study Regulations of the Faculty of Arts. In the bachelor study programmes, the state examination consists only of the defence of the bachelor's thesis. The student chooses the department as a training centre which corresponds to the discipline within which he/she wants to write the final thesis. He/she reports this choice by the deadline set by the department, provided that he/she is able to find a supervisor and a suitable topic in the relevant department. For the successful defence of the bachelor's thesis as the subject of the state examination in the bachelor degree programmes conducted at the Department of British and American Studies, students will receive credits according to the current study plan (currently 12 credits). Requirements for the admission to the defence are as follows: - fulfillment of the requirements of the study plan concerning the prescribed composition of courses and their credit value so that after awarding the credits for the state examination the student obtains the required number of credits for the bachelor's degree; - submission of the bachelor's thesis (electronically via the academic information system AIS) by the thesis submission deadline corresponding to the relevant state examination period according to the academic year schedule set by the faculty. The thesis is evaluated by the standard grading scale (0-59% -FX, 60-67% -E, 68-75% -D, 76-83% -C, 84-91% -B, 92-100% -A) by the supervisor of the thesis and the designated opponent in the assessment reports, which are available to the student no later than 3 working days before the state examination. The supervisor's report shall also include the percentage of compliance results from the originality check protocols (CRZP, Theses), which must be explicitly evaluated by the supervisor with the wording "the thesis shows/does not show signs of plagiarism". The bachelor's thesis will take the following form: The defence will consist of a thesis presentation (the student chooses the form of the defence, the PPT format can also be used) and the student's response to a broader theoretical question, which is assigned to the student by the supervisor upon the bachelor's thesis submission. The supervisor will include this question in the assessment report as one of the points of discussion for the defence; it will also be included in the defence report. The thesis presentation must: - Include a clearly articulated thesis statement, - have a clear and logical structure of argumentation and findings, - reflect a new perspective on the issue as a result of adequate and appropriate work with the findings gained through own research, the conclusions of which the student is able to present and formulate. The criteria for the evaluation (of the defence) of the bachelor's thesis at the Department of British and American Studies are as follows:	

- Quality of the bachelor's thesis (originality, significance of the analysis, clear formulation of the scientific problem and hypotheses under study, scope of the professional and scientific literature used), - the adequacy of the methodological approach to the topic under study, the analysis logically and coherently answers the research questions, - systematic and logical summary of the results of the analysis, - compliance with citation standards (MLA...), - language level of the presentation (academic language at least at B2 level), - quality of the presentation and communication skills. The evaluation of the thesis will include the areas below with the corresponding weighting (out of 100): PART A: CONTENT • Overall structure and organization (adequacy, scope, objectivity, coherence, cohesion) 15 • Theoretical knowledge related to the research topic 15 • Methodology (identifying concepts, research problems, aims, tasks, choosing adequate methods) 15 • Analysis (quality, depth, complexity) 15 • Originality and contribution (degree of originality, own contribution to knowledge) 10 PART B: FORM • Adequate work with information sources (extent, structure, reliability, adequacy, compliance with a citation style) 15 • Language and style 10 • Typography and layout 5 Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 0/100 (%)
Learning outcomes: • Upon successful completion of the course, students will be familiar with the basic requirements for academic writing and with the rules of academic integrity. • They will have mastered the theory of working with sources and have the skills to compile correct bibliographic entries. • They will have understood the principles of writing a bachelor's thesis, both in terms of form and content, as laid out by the university's regulations. • They will have understood the causes of plagiarism, they will be able to recognize its types and know how to avoid it. • They will have sufficient research skills to obtain, process, and interpret sources. • They will have mastered the basics for writing a Master's thesis. • They will have a deep knowledge of the thesis topic and will be able to approach it both critically and creatively.
Class syllabus: 1. The student presents the bachelor's thesis in front of the state examination committee, the supervisor and the opponent of the bachelor's thesis, and those present. 2. The student responds to the comments and questions in the assessments. 3. The student responds to the questions of the state examination committee or the questions in a broader debate. 4. The student responds to the pre-given general question from the supervisor's assessment. 5. A closed vote of the state examination committee on the evaluation of the bachelor's thesis defence. 6. Announcement of the evaluation (of the thesis defence) of the bachelor's thesis.

8. Baroque literature: basic concepts (conceito, meraviglia, propagandistic Baroque, etc.).
9. The sacred register of Baroque literature. Baroque emblems, allegorism of Baroque literature, contamination of genres.
10. The heroic register of Baroque literature: the work of M. Zrínyi. The epic and the theory of the epic. Eschatological, intertextual, interdisciplinary aspects of M. Zrínyi's epic.
11. The so-called courtly and gallant register of Baroque literature. The work of István Gyöngyösi.
12. Sacred and secular prose. Autobiographies, historiography, short stories, adaptations, conversions, letters.
13. Baroque drama: sacred drama, satirical dramas, comedies, mythological travesties, so-called school drama.
14. Rococo literature. Basic concepts, articulations, genres. Poetry and prose. Beginnings of the novel.
