The supervisor of the thesis and the thesis advisor shall draw up an evaluation of the bachelor thesis and propose an evaluation of A-FX grading scale, which shall be available to the student at least 3 working days before the defence. Criteria for evaluation of the bachelor thesis:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Contribution of the bachelor thesis, fulfillment of the objectives of the thesis in its assignment and fulfillment of the requirements for the content of the bachelor thesis. the requirements of the thesis given by the internal quality system of Charles University. The following is assessed: demonstration of knowledge and understanding, the ability to work creatively in the study programme, the ability applied in the collection, interpretation and processing of the basic literature; in the case of a practically oriented bachelor's thesis mastery of the application of theoretical assumptions in practice and the verifiability of hypotheses; 2. Originality of the thesis (the bachelor's thesis must not be plagiarised, must not infringe the author's the rights of other authors); the documentation for the defence of the bachelor thesis also includes protocols originality reports from the CRZP and Theses, on the results of which the thesis supervisor and the opponent comment in their reports; 3. Correctness and correctness of citation of used information sources, research results of other of other authors and authors' teams, correctness of the description of methods and working procedures of other authors the correctness of the methods used by other authors or author teams; 4. Compliance of the structure of the bachelor thesis with the prescribed structure defined by the internal system quality of the CU; 5. comprehensively evaluate the quality of the bachelor thesis, assess the manner and form of the defence and the ability to the student to respond adequately to the comments and questions in the thesis supervisor's reports

and the opponent. The evaluation will be obtained from the arithmetic average of the evaluations from the supervisor's of the thesis supervisor, the thesis opponent and the evaluation of the examination committee.

Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 0/100.

authors from Hungary, the Czech lands, Slovakia, and Poland, and situate their works within the broader processes of nation-building, modernization, and the emergence of new public spheres.

Students will be capable of analyzing literary texts from a gender-sensitive and comparative perspective, recognizing how women writers engaged with key issues such as national identity, women's emancipation, urbanization, and the representation of rural life. They will understand how the rise of mass journalism and literary periodicals shaped women's opportunities for publication and public recognition, and how these media influenced literary form and audience.

The course will also equip students with practical and theoretical skills for working with archival and textual sources, including manuscript legacies, letters, diaries, and unpublished materials. Students will gain an introductory competence in the preparation of critical editions, learning how to compare textual variants, establish reliable texts, annotate historical and cultural references, and reflect on editorial decision-making.

Finally, students will be able to critically assess how nineteenth-century women writers have been remembered, marginalized, or re-evaluated in school curricula, public monuments, and visual media such as film. In this way, the course develops both interpretive and methodological skills, enabling students to connect literary analysis with broader questions of cultural memory, canon formation, and historical representation in Central Europe.

Course requirements: a) during the teaching part (continuously) a paper (30%) on a selected topic from the topic of ancient literature, e.g.: Anacreon and his influence on Hungarian literature; Homeric epics and the development of Hungarian epic tradition; Ancient tradition in contemporary Hungarian literature; The sources and forms of comicalness in ancient drama, etc. (b) in the examination period: written test (70%) The condition for admission to the examination is the achievement of at least 10% of the intermediate mark. Violation of academic ethics will result in the cancellation of the points obtained in the respective item The student will be required to complete the item in question in the appropriate marking item. Learning outcomes: After successful completion of the course, the student has knowledge of the development of ancient and medieval world literature, acquires skills in the analysis of literary works, is informed about artistic trends and tendencies, literary genres. The student will learn about leading authors, socio-cultural aspects of the period, and the various literary techniques necessary to analyse specific texts.

1. The origins of European literature. Homer and Homeric poetry.
2. The epic in ancient literature. Hesiod, Virgil and Apollonios Rhodios.
3. Greek lyric and choral poetry. Sappho, Alkaios, Anacreon, Pindaros. Anacreonian songs. Epigrams from the Greek Anthology.
4. Eclogue in Greek and Roman literature. Theocritus and Vergilius. Roman elegy (Tibullus, Propertius, Ovid).
5. Characteristic features of Greek theatre. Sophocles, Euripides, Aeschylus.
6. Roman tragedy (Seneca). Greek and Roman comedy. Aristophanes, Menandros, Plautus.
7. Introduction to Roman poetry. Lucretius, Catullus, Horatius, Ovid. Epigrams (Martialis) and fables (Phaedrus).
8. Greek and Roman prose works I. Historiography (Herodotus, Thucydides, Iulius Caesar, Sallustius, Titus Livius, Tacitus, Suetonius, Plutarch).
9. Greek and Roman prose fiction II. Rhetoric. Demosthenes, Isocrates, Lysias, Cicero. Plato: The Defence of Socrates.
10. The Greek and Roman novel. Longos, Petronius. Epistola and the letter in ancient literature.
11. The influence of ancient literature on medieval literature. Ancient Christian literature. Ambrosius and St. Augustine. Genres of Byzantine poetry: hymn, canon, kontakion, troparion.

the period, acquire skills in analysing literary works, and have an overview of the influence of Renaissance and Baroque world literature on Hungarian literature.
