## **Course requirements:**

All matters pertaining to state examination are set out in Article 14 of the Study Regulations of the Faculty of Arts.

In the bachelor study programmes, the state examination consists only of the defence of the bachelor's thesis. The student chooses the department as a training centre which corresponds to the discipline within which he/she wants to write the final thesis. He/she reports this choice by the deadline set by the department, provided that he/she is able to find a supervisor and a suitable topic in the relevant department.

For the successful defence of the bachelor's thesis as the subject of the state examination in the bachelor degree programmes conducted at the Department of British and American Studies, students will receive credits according to the current study plan (currently 12 credits).

Requirements for the admission to the defence are as follows:

- fulfillment of the requirements of the study plan concerning the prescribed composition of courses and their credit value so that after awarding the credits for the state examination the student obtains the required number of credits for the bachelor's degree;
- submission of the bachelor's thesis (electronically via the academic information system AIS) by the thesis submission deadline corresponding to the relevant state examination period according to the academic year schedule set by the faculty.

The thesis is evaluated by the standard grading scale (0-59% -FX, 60-67% -E, 68-75% -D, 76-83% -C, 84-91% -B, 92-100% -A) by the supervisor of the thesis and the designated opponent in the assessment reports, which are available to the student no later than 3 working days before the state examination.

The supervisor's report shall also include the percentage of compliance results from the originality check protocols (CRZP, Theses), which must be explicitly evaluated by the supervisor with the wording "the thesis shows/does not show signs of plagiarism".

The bachelor's thesis will take the following form:

The defence will consist of a thesis presentation (the student chooses the form of the defence, the PPT format can also be used) and the student's response to a broader theoretical question, which is assigned to the student by the supervisor upon the bachelor's thesis submission. The supervisor will include this question in the assessment report as one of the points of discussion for the defence; it will also be included in the defence report.

The thesis presentation must:

- Include a clearly articulated thesis statement,
- have a clear and logical structure of argumentation and findings,
- reflect a new perspective on the issue as a result of adequate and appropriate work with the findings gained through own research, the conclusions of which the student is able to present and formulate. The criteria for the evaluation (of the defence) of the bachelor's thesis at the Department of British and American Studies are as follows:

- Quality of the bachelor's thesis (originality, significance of the analysis, clear formulation of the scientific problem and hypotheses under study, scope of the professional and scientific literature used),
- the adequacy of the methodological approach to the topic under study, the analysis logically and coherently answers the research questions,
- systematic and logical summary of the results of the analysis,
- compliance with citation standards (MLA...),
- language level of the presentation (academic language at least at B2 level),
- quality of the presentation and communication skills.

Students will submit translation of a literary text in the length of three norm pages (30 % of evaluation) in the middle of the term. Students will choose texts in the genre of a short story, an excerpt of a novel or a theatre play in prose of any text in English. Students will accompany their translations with a short commentary explaining their concept of translation and the chosen translation methods in the length of fifteen lines. At the end of the term students will submit translations of literary texts in the length of five norm pages, and the commentary in the length of one page (40 % of evaluation).

Students will perform an oral presentation dealing with great personalities of Slovak translation, reception of translation from English speaking countries or a comparative analysis of a chosen excerpt of any literary work originated in Anglo-Saxon countries (30 % of evaluation of the subject). Students will be evaluated on the basis of mid-term, and final translation and on an oral presentation according to the above percentual ratio.

Students will learn with chosen excerpts of some works of translation theory by George Steiner, Anton Popovič, Alojz Keníž and others.

Students will gain rudimentary skills in interpretation of various texts, identification of stylistic level of a txt and problems of equivalence in translation from the source into target language.

Students will learn to identify subtle stylistic shades of the text of a literary work.

Students will master ways how to proceed in a systematic way, to verify translated parts of the text with parts already translated and should realize that in an adequate translation, the translation on a "micro-level" of the text should be in agreement with the concept of text as a whole.

## Class syllabus:

- 1. Interpretation of a literary work as a basic prerequisite of functionally adequate and congenial translation of a literary work. Perils of sub-interpretation and over-interpretation of a literary work.
- 2. Various types of translation according to a genre of the translated literary work. Specific features of the translation of drama genres as well as translations for other media (film and television).
- 3. Functional shifts: exoticization and naturalization in translation. Adequacy of such methods and a correct measure of their combination or creolization of translation.
- 4. Substandard linguistic elements in translation and possibilities or their solutions. Utilization of particular dialectic levels of the target language or creation of a synthetic stylistic category of language in relaying substandard elements of the original.
- 5. Cultural and geographical facts and allusions: translation of geographical names and cultural institutions. Practical examples showing how inconsistent methods of a translator in translating cultural and geographical facts subvert a trust of a reader in adequacy of the submitted translation.
- 6. Idioms, set phrases, proverbs. These features require great skills in creativity and improvisation of a translator. Other cultural traditions in translating of famous quotations and literary allusions.
- 7. The problem of using the second person singular and plural in verbs and possible ways of its solution. Other differences in grammatical systems of the source and target languages.
- 8. Editing of the text by translator him/herself as a condition of a high-quality production of the translation. The need of holistic concept of translation: the translation of particular features should not contradict with basic ideas of the translated text.
- 9. The need of verification of factual details in translating literary works of art. Merging of elements of scholarly and professional literature used in the text of a literary work in question: taxonomy of plants and animals, using of units of weight, length and other units, or other scholarly terms used in physics, chemistry etc.

Equally important is the improvement of the work with the translation, especially the choice of stylistically appropriate expressions, as well as the grammatical and stylistic correctness of the translation. Students will also acquaint themselves with the work of proofreaders and through exercises and articles refine their practical knowledge of Slovak language.

The analysis of expressions from the point of view of translation, interpretation of the original, identification of problematic passages, comparison of the original and the translation including the already published translations, discussion on the used expressions, the most commontranslation mistakes, the work with already translated text – its editing, exercises to improve Slovak language, proofreading.

- 9. Rhythm as a phenomenon of life and literature, meter and its units (feet), mixed verse (logaeds).
