Learning outcomes: The student will gain the ability to understand and interpret a literary text in the literary-historical and literary-aesthetic contexts of the second half of the 20th century, will gain a reliable overview of the development of words. literature in this period, learns a wide range of works of authors and reads in depth the most important works of the period. He will also gain the framework of knowledge and skills needed to further his own relevant analysis of the research problems associated with this period.	
Class syllabus: 1. Periodization of Slovak literature from the end of the WW2 to the end of the 20th century: main milestones, characteristics of individual periods, period controversies, determining canons and authors. 2. Transitional period 1945-48. The end of the tendencies of the 1940s (surrealism, naturism, Catholic modernism) and the announcement of new trends (social realism).	

3. Advent of socialist realism, its sources and doctrine: main themes and forms in poetry and prose, representatives (M. Lajčiak, F. Hečko, V. Mináč, etc.).
4. Neo-avant-garde in poetry from the end of the 1950s: return to the traditions of modernism and the avant-garde (M. Válek, M. Rúfus), Concretists; rehabilitation of the left avant-garde (L. Novomeský, superrealism); Prose Generation 56.
5. "Golden Sixties". Connection to world currents of thought and art (existentialism, new novel, absurd literature). Other forms of modern poetry (Lone Runners).
6. The onset of a significant prose generation (J. Johanides, V. Šikula, R. Sloboda, P. Hrúz, P. Vilikovský).
7. Normalization of literature in the 70s: an attempt to revitalize soc. realism (so-called engaged literature, or neoschematism); the changed publishing situation in the early 1970s; officially preferred genres and themes; stratification lit. life in the period of normalization (official literature, exile, dissident, gray zone).
8. Poetry in the period of normalization: Mihálek's school of poetry, so-called engaged literature (M. Válek), its topics and poetics; "non-consolidated", resp. only partially "consolidated" authors (preserving the heritage of the 1960s). Poetry of Š. Strážay and Š. Moravčík as the "reverse" of the normalization picture of the world.
9. Prose of 70.-80. years: inclination to historicism and its socio-cultural interpretation in the so-called novel sagas (V. Šikula, P. Jaroš, I. Habaj, L. Ballek); analytical prose of introspective (R. Sloboda), artistic (J. Johanides) and ironic type (P. Vilikovský, P. Hrúz); prose of model cold (D. Mitana), life paradox (J. Puškáš) and human favor (D. Dušek). Author in opposition: D. Tatarka.
10. Advent of a new generation of poetry and prose in the 80's (J. Urban, I. Kolenič, V. Klimáček, E. Groch). Changes in cultural and political coordinates in the period of the so-called redevelopment.
11. Unofficial and later also the official crowd of the new prose generation, which represents a fundamental departure from the neo-modernist line of Slovak literature of previous generations and presents the so-called prose of ironic perpetuation (P. Pišťanek, D. Taragel, I. Otčenáš). Academic irony of S. Rakús.
12. The vicissitudes of D. Tatarka's life and work as a synecdochal recapitulation of the transformations of society and literature of the individual decades of the second half of the 20th century.

Learning outcomes: After the successful completion of the course, the students will have acquired knowledge in the field of bilingualism and contact linguistics in general, with the main emphasis on the bilingualism of Hungarian communities and on contact linguistic issues related to the Hungarian language, especially its varieties in Slovakia. They have knowledge of both the individual and the social bilingualism, including questions of bilingual education. They gain insight into the most important issues related to the linguistic behaviour of bilingual speakers and their impact on language	

change in bilingual communities. They will be introduced to basic topics in areal linguistics and interlinguistics.

Class syllabus:

1. Basic issues of bilingualism and bilingualism research. Types of bilingualism.
2. The questions of individual bilingualism.
3. The issues of societal bilingualism: bilingual communities; minority and majority bilingualism.
4. Other issues of societal bilingualism: domains of language use; diglossia; language assimilation and language attrition; language rights.
5. Bilingual education. Linguicism and its consequences. Types of bilingual education programmes.
6. Linguistic behaviour of bilingual speakers (code choice and code switching, other communicative strategies).
7. Basic issues of contact linguistics. Linguistic interference in general and at individual levels of the language system. Linguistic borrowing, linguistic substrate and superstrate. Types of borrowing, integration of borrowing.
8. Mixed languages and language varieties.
9. Areal linguistics. Interlinguistics.
10. Pidgin and Creole languages.
11. Superdiversity, multilingualism, plurilingualism.
12. Polylingualism: a new perspective on multilingualism and language contact issues.

Course requirements: Students will complete the course through an individual, practice-oriented project that reflects both their academic interests and their professional goals. Depending on their specialization, students may design teaching modules inspired by nineteenth-century women writers, prepare annotated translations of literary or epistolary texts, work with manuscripts and printed sources from an editorial perspective, or write a scholarly or popular article based on their research, with the possibility of publication after the course. Through these projects, students will learn how to prepare critical editions, write editorial and contextual notes, and interpret or translate texts within their historical and cultural frameworks. Preliminary evaluation during the instruction period: Presentation of one selected topic in the form of a report (30%). In the examination period: Colloquial exam consisting of the presentation and defence of a written project (70%). Grading scale: A: 100%–92% B: 91%–84% C: 83%–76% D: 75%–68% E: 67%–60% FX: 59%–0% Credit will not be awarded to a student who does not master 60% of the curriculum. Instructor will accept a maximum of 2 absences with documented evidence. Examination dates will be published via AIS no later than the last week of the semester. Scale of assessment (preliminary/final): 30/70	
Learning outcomes: Upon successful completion of the course, students will have acquired a comprehensive understanding of the role of women writers in nineteenth-century Central Europe and of the cultural, political, and social contexts in which they worked. They will be able to identify major female	

authors from Hungary, the Czech lands, Slovakia, and Poland, and situate their works within the broader processes of nation-building, modernization, and the emergence of new public spheres. Students will be capable of analyzing literary texts from a gender-sensitive and comparative perspective, recognizing how women writers engaged with key issues such as national identity, women's emancipation, urbanization, and the representation of rural life. They will understand how the rise of mass journalism and literary periodicals shaped women's opportunities for publication and public recognition, and how these media influenced literary form and audience. The course will also equip students with practical and theoretical skills for working with archival and textual sources, including manuscript legacies, letters, diaries, and unpublished materials. Students will gain an introductory competence in the preparation of critical editions, learning how to compare textual variants, establish reliable texts, annotate historical and cultural references, and reflect on editorial decision-making. Finally, students will be able to critically assess how nineteenth-century women writers have been remembered, marginalized, or re-evaluated in school curricula, public monuments, and visual media such as film. Learning outcomes: After successful participation in the course the student has an overview in different approaches to literature of 20th and 21st century and he/she is able to put them into the context of evolutionary steps of art. The student is able to grasp and comment on a scientific metatext (from domains of theory of literature, psychoanalysis, philosophy, esthetics), specific in its approach to literature. The student is capable of selecting aspects of the text in a way enabling him/her to use those in their own interpretation of a literary text or in their own reflection on art. The student is aware of the specifics of exact scientific methods as well as of more open approaches to literature. He/she has	

basic knowledge about developing his/her own competencies of reading and writing with aspects from various discussed metatexts.

Class syllabus:

The course helps in developing of reading and writing competencies. It is aimed at an overview of selected approaches to literature in theory of literature, psychoanalysis, philosophy, and esthetics, in international and domestic culture contexts. The course is executed as a set of interactive lectures.

Topics are:

1. Positivism and its detailed study of author's biography.
2. Formalism and its benefits in more complex interpretation of literary works.
3. „Antirealism“ in essays related to avantgarde art.
4. Psychoanalysis and its insight into functions of libido in the process of creating text..
5. Psychoanalytical insights into existential writing longing to find the meaning of life.
6. Phenomenology and its study of forces of nature (mainly fire and water) in imagination.
7. Structuralism, its “story” in Russian, French, Czech and Slovak context.
8. Structuralist analysis of poetry and prose.
9. Semiology and its suggestions on distancing from lies and power of language.
10. Relationship between terms semiotics and semiology.
11. Postmodern philosophy and esthetics, its insight in approach to art and life.
12. Cognitive sciences in study of poetry and prose.
13. Aspect of gender in history of literature and in its interpretation.

During selected parts of the lectures, Slovak and world poetry and prose will be interpreted and interactively discussed. Visual artworks will also be presented, since one of the goals of the course is to show how science connects to the power of art.

The Master's thesis will take the following form: The defence will consist of a thesis presentation (the student chooses the form of the defence, the PPT format can also be used) and the student's response to a broader theoretical question, which is assigned to the student by the supervisor upon the Master's thesis submission. The supervisor will include this question in the assessment report as one of the points of discussion for the defence; it will also be included in the defence report. Successful completion of the state exam is one of the conditions for successful completion of the study program. The subject of the state exam is evaluated by the commission for state exams with classification grades A to FX. The examination commission decides by consensus on the evaluation of the state examination or its part. If the examination commission does not reach a consensus, the evaluation of the state examination or its part is decided by voting. Based on the wording of the study regulations of the faculty (VP 5/2020, Art. 15), the framework dates of state examinations are set by the dean in accordance with the faculty study schedule. Departments are obliged to publish their state exam dates on the website no later than 5 weeks before they take place. The student registers for the state exam through the academic information system at least three weeks before the date of its holding. The student is entitled to one regular and two resit dates of the state exam. The regular term is the one for which the student applied for the first time within the deadline set for state exams. If the student was evaluated with the FX mark on the regular date of the state exam, the student can make the corrective dates of the state exam (a) at the following dates for the holding of State examinations in the relevant academic year; or b) within the deadlines for holding state examinations in any of the following academic years in accordance with § 65, par. 2 of the Higher Education Act. If a student is unable to attend the date of the state examination for which he / she has registered, he / she is obliged to apologize in writing to the chairman of the examination commission in advance or no later than three working days after the date of the state examination or its part, if there were serious obstacles that in advance. Learning outcomes: The student will acquire the practical application of knowledge in a real environment in the form of a professional practice, which must meet the following criteria: a) assigned by the coordinator of the translation practice within a specified scope or carried out in a translation, interpreting, publishing or localization company approved by the responsible teacher; b) in the scope of a minimum of 25 hours per semester; c) supplemented by proofreading or another format of feedback, and in the case of a practice in a company, confirmed in writing by the company in question, together with a breakdown of the student's specific activities.	
Class syllabus: Practical application of the acquired knowledge in the field of translation and interpretation, localisation, or editorial and editorial activities in the native or foreign language. Understanding of working procedures, quality control, professional and communication standards, direct personal experience of communication with a client or feedback from a proofreader. The internship can be carried out within the Centre for Translation and Interpreting Practice or in a private or public company. In principle, it should include the following range of translation/interpreting activities: translation of a minimum of 20 standard pages or interpreting services of a minimum of 12 hours of interpreting and preparation
