Learning outcomes: After the successful completion of the course, the students will have acquired knowledge in the field of bilingualism and contact linguistics in general, with the main emphasis on the bilingualism of Hungarian communities and on contact linguistic issues related to the Hungarian language, especially its varieties in Slovakia. They have knowledge of both the individual and the social bilingualism, including questions of bilingual education. They gain insight into the most important issues related to the linguistic behaviour of bilingual speakers and their impact on language	

change in bilingual communities. They will be introduced to basic topics in areal linguistics and interlinguistics.

Class syllabus:

1. Basic issues of bilingualism and bilingualism research. Types of bilingualism.
2. The questions of individual bilingualism.
3. The issues of societal bilingualism: bilingual communities; minority and majority bilingualism.
4. Other issues of societal bilingualism: domains of language use; diglossia; language assimilation and language attrition; language rights.
5. Bilingual education. Linguicism and its consequences. Types of bilingual education programmes.
6. Linguistic behaviour of bilingual speakers (code choice and code switching, other communicative strategies).
7. Basic issues of contact linguistics. Linguistic interference in general and at individual levels of the language system. Linguistic borrowing, linguistic substrate and superstrate. Types of borrowing, integration of borrowing.
8. Mixed languages and language varieties.
9. Areal linguistics. Interlinguistics.
10. Pidgin and Creole languages.
11. Superdiversity, multilingualism, plurilingualism.
12. Polylingualism: a new perspective on multilingualism and language contact issues.

The student is familiar with the methodological issues of literary criticism and philological research. The discipline is also aimed at broadening students'	

knowledge of the following areas: general and special issues of scientific research, scientific work in universities, work in libraries, methods of information processing.

5. Critical edition (editio critica), critical features, abbreviations, most important critical and facsimile editions.
6. Basic concepts of codicology.
7. Palaeography and other auxiliary sciences.
8. Bibliographies, scientific journals.
9. Libraries, sources, handbooks.
10. So-called new philology. (B. Cerquiglini).
11. Internet sources and critical editions.
12. Scholarly and authorial views on textual-critical issues in Hungarian literature.

Class syllabus:

1. Methodological issues of researching the history of churches and education in the conditions of Hungary. Relations between the Catholic Church and Protestant denominations.
2. Acceptance of Christianity in Hungary. The structure of the Church and the role of orders in the Middle Ages.
3. The crisis of the Catholic Church at the beginning of the 16th century. The Reformation and the spread of the Reformation in Hungary.
4. Medieval education: parochial, monastic and chapter schools. The influence of the Reformation on the town schools.
5. Jesuit education: grammar schools and university in Trnava. Catholic education in general. Protestant colleges and lyceums.
6. Relationship of Catholicism and Protestantism in the Monarchy in the 17th and 18th centuries. The Estates' Revolts.
7. Ratio Educationis and the organization of education in the Monarchy in general and in Hungary in particular. Ideological divergence between Catholic and Protestant education.
8. Catholicism and Protestantism in the 19th Century: conservative tendencies in the Catholic Church and disputes between Protestant denominations.
9. Changes in the education system in the Monarchy after the Revolution: the Entwurf. The transformation of grammar schools and university studies in Hungary.
10. The Austro-Hungarian Settlement and its effect on church life and on the school system.
11. Hungarian education after 1918. The inter-war period and efforts to modernise education.
12. The fate of the churches during socialism and the Hungarian school system. Changes after 1989.

monuments of Hungarian literature. Literature, socio-cultural aspects of the period, acquire skills in the analysis of literary works of early Hungarian literature. The student will also learn basic philological approaches to the sources.

Class syllabus:

1. Introduction to the history of Old Hungarian. Literature.
2. Medieval literature: chronicles and so-called gestures.
3. Latin and Hungarian sacred literature in Hungary. Medieval genres: legends, sermons, first translations of the Bible, sacred poetry. The first monuments of Hungarian literature.
4. Humanism and Renaissance: the poetry of Jan Pannonia in the European context. Genres of neo-Latin poetry in Hungary.
5. Humanism and the Renaissance. Prose works and historiography (Galeotto Marzio, Antonio Bonfini, István Brodarics, Miklós Oláh, Ferenc Forgách, etc.).
6. Beginnings of Hungarian. Poetry and artistic prose (Ómagyar Mária-siralom, love poetry, occasional literature, etc.)
7. Literature of the Reformation. Verse chronicles, so-called. Biblical history, verse stories.
8. The work of S. Tinódi and genres of verse epics.
9. The poetic works of B. Balassi.
10. Beginnings of Hungarian dramatic production
11. Mannerism and the work of J. Rimay. Neostoicism, religious and secular poetry.
12. Translations of the Psalms and creation. A. M. Szenci.
13. Mannerism in prose. (M. Szepsi Csombor, K. Darholcz, P. Alvinczy, etc.)

Baroque literature, socio-cultural aspects of the period, acquire skills in the analysis of literary works of Hungarian literature of the 17th and 18th centuries. The student will also learn the basic philological approaches to the sources.

Class syllabus:

1. Baroque literature: basic concepts
2. The sacral register of Baroque literature. Baroque emblems, allegorism of Baroque literature, contamination of genres. (M. Nyéki Vörös, M. Hajnal)
